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Getting Better

This is the story of a dear, sweet soul. Only 67, we don't know his entire story. We know he lived many years at the Campbell Street homeless camp. He came to Hildegard House from the University of Louisville hospital. He was there under an alias because he was afraid. The last set of "friends" that he lived with stole all his money and verbally abused him. While he was in the hospital, his wallet was stolen again. He was anxious, alone and afraid.

He was thin and frail, almost child-like, so simple and curious and naive. And he had pancreatic cancer. When he first came to Hildegard House, he stayed in his room. He laid in the dark, with the cover over his ahead. He spent the first few days just sleeping. As the days went by, he began to talk with the volunteers and would eat a little bit. He never complained about anything, not even pain.



He told us one day that he had received treatment at the Brown Cancer Center. "The doctor told me that I should drink Ensure because I was so thin. Ensure! Do you think he knows how much Ensure costs?"

We told him to wait a minute, went to the refrigerator, and brought out a bottle of chocolate Ensure. A case had just been donated to us. It was handed to him. He looked at it. He cuddled it like a baby. He said, "Is this for me? I can have it?" He looked at it as if it was a miracle potion. And he was able to have Ensure every day. A simple pleasure.

If you asked him, "How are you today, Michael?" He would say "I'm good!" And next he would ask, "How is everybody around here? Is everybody okay?" He began to care about all the volunteers. He began to know their names. Every morning he would come out into the living room, sit in the recliner, and talk a little. He began to eat his meals in the living room.

He lived at Hildegard House for 3 months. He never had one visitor or phone call. Yet, he had a positive attitude. He told all of us, "I'm getting better!" Maybe he was in denial, maybe he wanted to believe he could get better. But in some ways, he was getting better. He was not as anxious or afraid. He trusted the Compassionate Companions and enjoyed talking with us.

He frequently came out of his room, sat in the recliner, drinking his Ensure. When he got weaker and couldn't leave his bed, he would ask a Compassionate Companion to come in and talk with him. He said once that he was afraid to die, but that he knew someone would be with him.

A Word from the Executive Director




Special things are always happening to me.

At dinner with my friends Elsie and Allen Atherton, I learned a story about Allen's late brother, John, who was a poet – whose poems had been lost. When Hildegard House was beginning, we had a pre-renovation party and invited people to

come to the party and write on the walls – quotations, poems, or meaningful sayings. Elsie came to this party and noticed a poem written on the wall with credit to Allen's brother. She immediately came to me and asked who had written this on the wall. We discovered that John had been really attached to his Hosparus nurse, Betsy Cambron, and gave her his book of poetry. Betsy had written this poem on the wall. Elsie took a picture of this poem home to Allen. He carries this on a small card in his wallet: (card, right)

Another day, as I opened an envelope, this sweet note dropped out. "Enclosed is a donation in memory of our aunt who died in August at near 99. She lived her last five years in assisted living and the last year bedridden with sitters 24 hours a day. Fortunately, she had resources to pay for the care she needed, but at the end of her life, her depleting funds were a source of worry for her. I chose your charity because of the care you give those who don't have family or resources to care for them. Thank you for the love and care you give the residents of Hildegard House."
