A GOOD HAIRCUT CAN MAKE YOU YOU Smile!

ne of the first things Joe told Compassionate Companion Suzanne Dugan is, "I want a haircut." Joe arrived in late summer, when our usual volunteer hair stylist was away. But a haircut was on his mind.

Joe was a widower and lived alone before coming to Hildegard House. His only brother lived several states away. Without the resources for 24-hour care, Joe could not access hospice services when his illness became terminal. When he needed us, there was an opening at Hildegard House.

Joe quickly charmed everyone here with his sweet temperament and stories. He talked about his days in the seminary, his travel to Italy and Hawaii, and growing up in Louisville. Occasionally, he would ask for a haircut.

Suzanne serves every other Friday morning with her daughter, Kelly Booker. They are the smiling mother and daughter team from 7 - 10 AM. Together they make breakfasts, provide medicines, and tidy up rooms. Kelly says that when they started serving together about 18 months ago they agreed that they would work half their shifts together and half their shifts with another Compassionate Companion, so they would get to know the rest of the volunteers.

"That was our agreement," she says, "because there are so many wonderful people here from all kinds of backgrounds. We want to know them and learn from them." Suzanne also serves every other Saturday morning with another Compassionate Companion.



Over the few days Joe lived at Hildegard House, he and Suzanne developed a friendship. As they talked, they learned that Joe – like Suzanne's father – had attended St. Meinrad during his high school years. He asked her to pray the rosary with him. "Sometimes you get attached," Suzanne says, "and he was special."

When she came back on Saturday morning, Joe asked for a haircut. "I've given my husband haircuts for 50 years", she said, "so I felt up to the job." As she cut his hair, Suzanne and Joe chatted comfortably. Then they took a picture together - both beaming. "Joe was so pleased," Suzanne said, "and that made me happy."

Joe died at six o'clock that evening.

Suzanne believes he was waiting for his hair cut. And she *knows* that Joe, like every resident at Hildegard House, spent his final days receiving loving care and experiencing deep connection with the people who cared for him. Everyone deserves to die with care and dignity. And a haircut if they want one.

Dear Friends,

One woman touched me by her life. Her shining example as a wife, mother, and grandmother. And she continues to touch me and so many, even with her death. Let me explain.

One beautiful April day, Councilman Andrew Owen and his wife, Nancy, came to visit Hildegard House. I could tell that Andrew especially was moved. He shared with me that his mother, Phyllis, was in the last stages of pancreatic cancer. I have known the Owen family for many years. I was sad to hear of this.

You probably know Tom Owen, the historian and politician. Phyllis was his wife. And the lighthouse of the Owen family.

Andrew and Nancy shared their visit with Phyllis. She too was moved. She wanted to make a small contribution in her will. She also said that in lieu of flowers, she wanted donations to go to Hildegard House. This is what her obituary said (in part): "Phyllis "Oma" Owen, died at home on May 28 th , 2023, surrounded by her family.... Because Phyllis was fortunate enough to be accompanied to her death at home by a chorus of family and friends, she asks that in lieu of flowers, donations be made in her memory to Hildegard House, a home supporting the terminally ill who might otherwise die alone."

The donations poured in. And Phyllis, the chorus is still singing! We are blest by the gift of your life. Thanks to all of you who support Hildegard House. It touches me. And it touches the volunteers and the residents who live and die here.

THE CALL TO COMPASSIONATE COMPANIONSHIP by Donnie Ruark

f you told me (in 2016) that I would be doing this," says Donnie Ruark, "I would have said you don't know what you're talking about." And yet, since 2018, Donnie has been a loyal Compassionate Companion at Hildegard House, becoming famous for cooking residents absolutely anything they want to eat - up to and including a kimchi omelet.

Donnie spent his career working with television news crews, on the scenes of life and death situations. When he retired, he imagined himself volunteering, but didn't know anything about Hildegard House until Compassionate Companion Sister Eva Kowalski told him she thought he should learn a little bit about the place.

"I drove right over," Donnie said, "and pretty much that was it." Donnie is here every week, most Thursday mornings with Marie. They jokingly call themselves the "Donnie and Marie Show." "There's nothing about it that is really hard. Making food, changing a brief, cleaning up a spill, talking with someone. And knowing that sometimes you are the last person that someone will ever talk to - that's really something."

Today, Donnie can't imagine not being a Compassionate Companion at Hildegard House. "I will be doing this until I am physically too feeble. It's so satisfying to be here."
